3. Continue identifying the elements of good writing particular to a genre, such as metaphor, symbols, irony, rhythm, and imagery.

4. Apply the elements of the writing process in revisions of original work, including pre-writing, revising rough drafts, copyediting, and proofreading.
5. Engage in a writing community by sharing and critiquing their writing in peer workshops.
6. Continue discovering and developing their unique voices through peer editing and workshops.
7. Critique revisions of writing from peers and provide constructive feedback based on elements of good writing.
8. Analyze revisions of their own work based on self-critique, elements of good writing and responses from peers and instructor.
9. Prepare a piece of revised original writing for publication.
