The organizing framework for the nursing practice will be introduced, including patient-centered care, teamwork and collaboration, safety and quality improvement, informatics and technology, evidence-based practice, and professionalism. Basic psychomotor and psychosocial concepts and skills will be practiced through clinical, lab and simulation.

Course Objectives

1. Recognize the novice nurse's roles and responsibilities in nursing practice.
2. Identify a nursing framework (theory based) that guides nursing care delivery with an emphasis on the older adult population.
3. Describe the organizing framework for nursing practice: Professionalism, patient-centered care, collaboration and communication, evidence based/clinical judgment (Nursing Process), Safety/Quality, and Informatics/Technology.
4. Outline the characteristics of professionalism: legal rights and responsibilities, ethical practice, role of nurse, and advocacy.
5. Utilize the concept of professionalism to cultivate professional nursing practice.
6. Demonstrate principles of the nursing process/clinical judgment to impact care delivery.
7. Outline the principles of holistic, patient-centered care with the emphasis on the older adult.
8. Identify the role of culture, patient values, self-management (self-care), advance directives/self-determination/life planning, spirituality in health promotion and disease prevention while reducing health disparities and promoting diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI).
9. Utilize physical assessment techniques that encompass health and wellness screening and promote disease management in a way that is culturally, spiritually, and LGBTQ+ supportive.
10. Identify concepts that promote health and wellness (Immunity/Infection; health promotion; comfort interventions).
11. Utilize the concepts of evidence-based practice, informatics, and technology to inform nursing clinical judgment for safe care delivery.
12. Define health disparity and its impact on care delivery for all patients.

Differentiate alterations in concepts of fluid balance (Fluid Balance (Dehydration & Fluid overload), Sleep (Insomnia), Nutrition (Oral Hydration, Total Parenteral Nutrition), Elimination (Incontinence, Retention, and Constipation), Oxygenation, Mobility, Skin integrity (pressure ulcers), Sensory Perception that impact wellness and patient outcomes.
